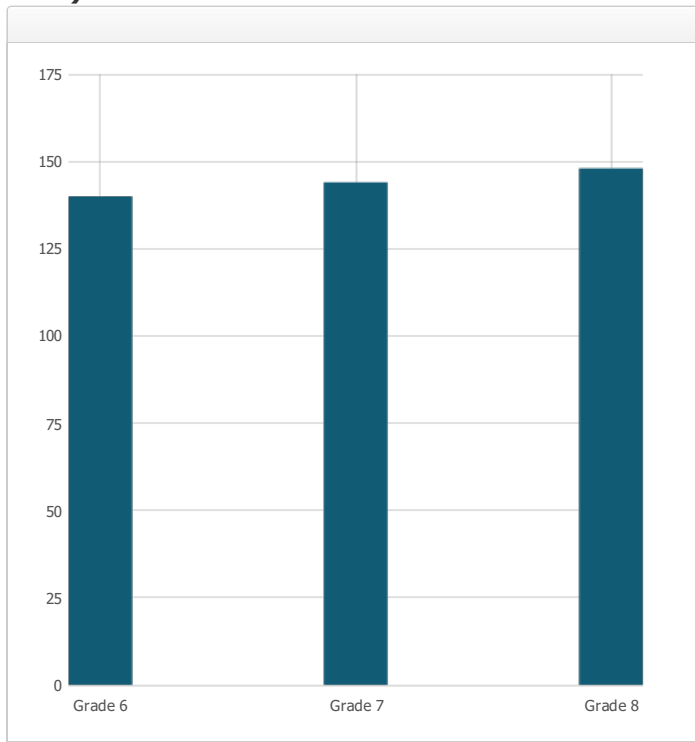

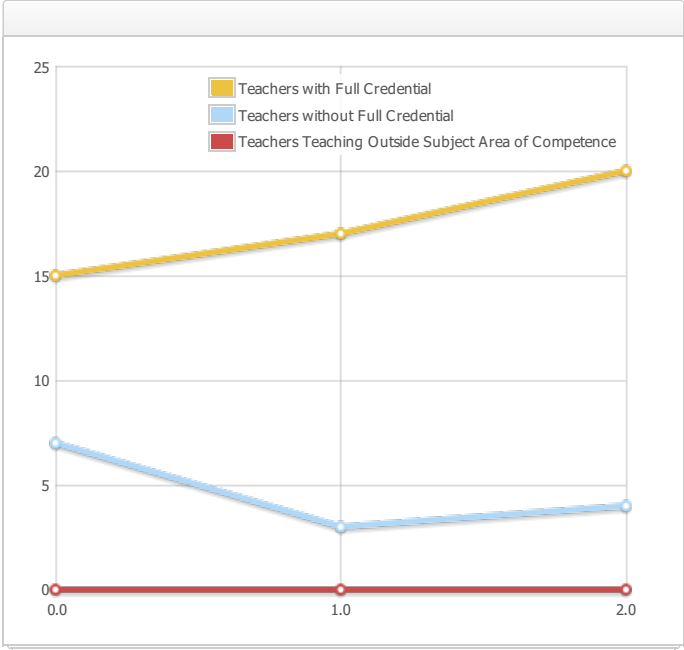

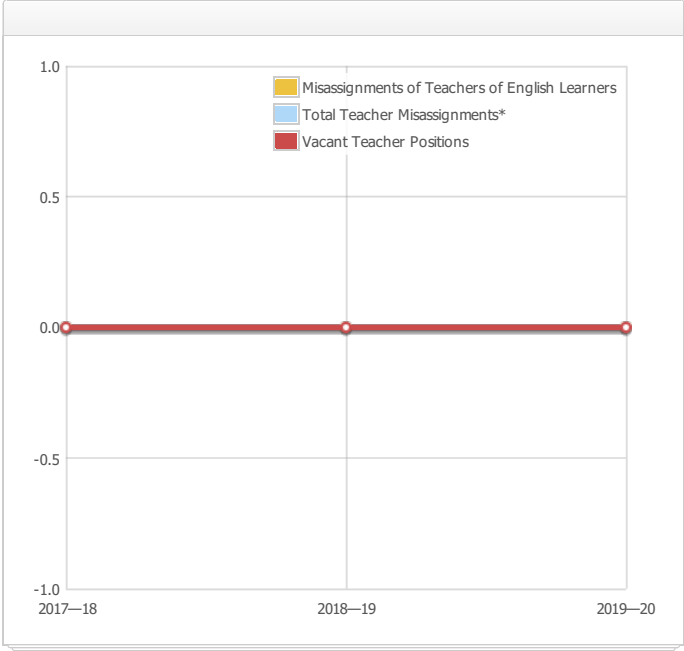

The school is located on grounds that vary between a small hilly area where the middle school is located and slopes gradually to a central campus area with an open field and then continue to the high school campus on relatively level ground. The grounds are relatively barren with large eucalyptus trees and some other planted areas around the portables that have been maintained on the site for several years. The multi-purpose room, offices, and restrooms are all converted portable buildings. The school has always maintained the desire to build permanent structures on the current site and due to a state grant, we will be able to do so. Improvements continue to be made in the decking around the classrooms, the walls of the classrooms are continuously examined and repaired as needed and the roofing is inspected annually and repaired each season. Parent volunteers also assist in the maintenance of the school's grounds and facilities. On most weekends, parents are volunteering their time in weekend work parties.

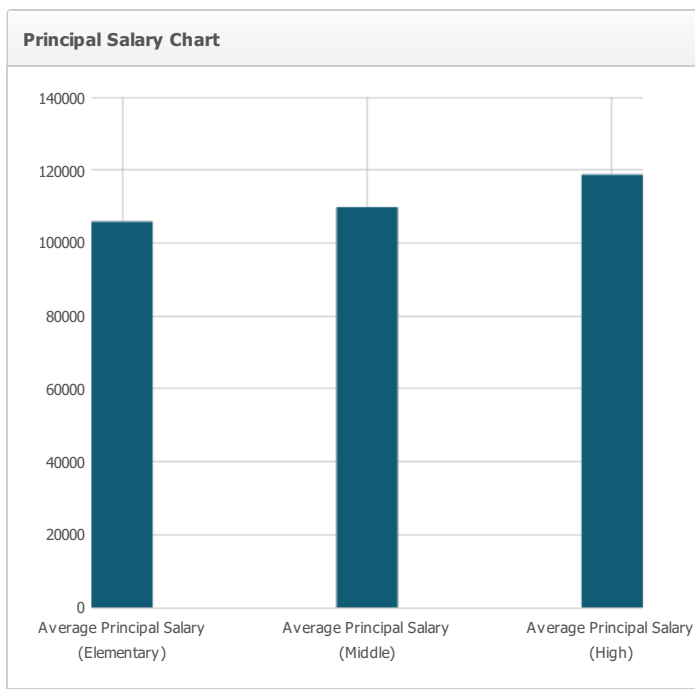
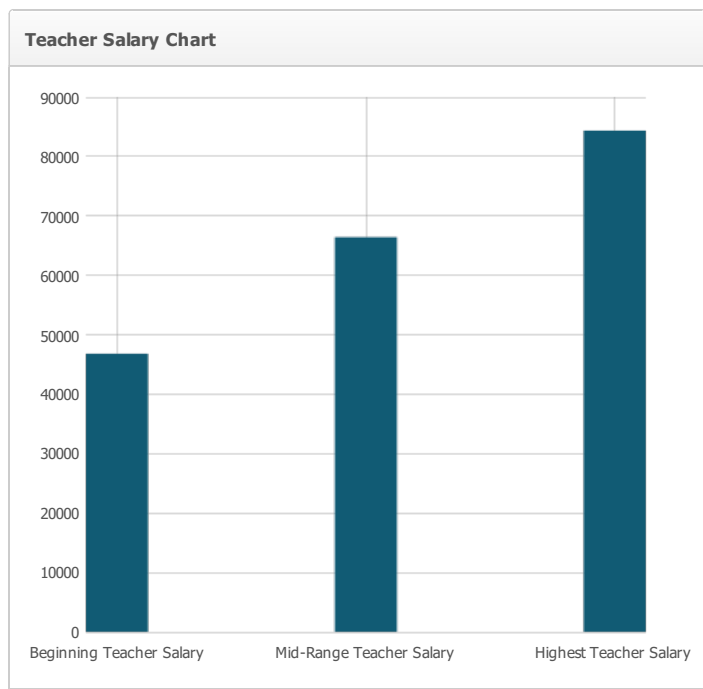
